

ACADEMIC STANDARDS

Academic standards are described in Oregon Administrative Rule Chapter 573, Division 095, Rule 0005 as follows:

(1) The maintenance of academic standards is a joint responsibility of the students and the faculty at Southern Oregon University. Freedom to teach and freedom to learn are dependent upon individual and collective conduct to permit the pursuit and exchange of knowledge and opinion. Faculty have the responsibility to create an atmosphere in which students may display their knowledge. This atmosphere includes an orderly testing room and sufficient safeguards to inhibit dishonesty. Students have the responsibility to rely on their own knowledge and resources in the evaluation process.

(a) Academic dishonesty is defined as cheating, plagiarism, or otherwise obtaining grades under false pretenses;

(b) Plagiarism is defined as knowingly submitting the language, ideas, thoughts, or work of another author as one's original work, or allowing one's work to be used in this fashion;

(c) Cheating is defined as:

(A) Using unauthorized information during an examination verbally, visually, or by unauthorized notes, books and other materials;

(B) Obtaining or providing information concerning an examination in advance of that examination;

(C) Taking an examination for another student or arranging to have someone else take an examination for you;

(D) Altering or changing:

(i) Test answers after that test has been submitted for grading;

(ii) Grades after the grades have been awarded; or

(iii) Other academic records, after those records have become official.

(d) Procedures: The faculty member who suspects a student of academic dishonesty should confront the student with the accusation. In the event that the student disputes the allegation of academic dishonesty, then the incident should always be referred to the chief academic affairs officer or designee. The academic decision should then be deferred pending finding on the allegation. If the student admits to the misconduct, then one or more of the following sanctions will be imposed by the instructor.

(A) Academic:

(i) Administratively withdraw the student from class. This action must have the approval of the chief academic affairs officer or designee and is subject to appeal through Grievance Procedures in OAR chapter 573, division 30, "Model Rules of Procedure Applicable to Contested Cases";

(ii) Award a failing mark on the test or paper; or

(iii) Require the student to take another test or resubmit the paper;

(iv) The academic sanctions described above may be employed alone, or in concert with disciplinary procedures. Refer to "Proscribed Conduct" rule OAR 573-075-0040(2)(a).

- (B) Disciplinary: The faculty member may refer the incident to the chief student affairs officer or designee where the disciplinary process will be followed to determine what, if any, disciplinary sanction is appropriate;
- (C) Faculty will notify the chief student affairs officer or designee of academic action taken so a record can be maintained.

ALCOHOL AND DRUG POLICY

Southern Oregon University is committed to promoting an environment that supports the health and well-being of every member of the campus community. Since drug and alcohol abuse can seriously impair an individual's personal and academic functioning, the University helps campus members make responsible decisions about drugs and alcohol. It is Southern's obligation, therefore, to provide pertinent drug and alcohol information, educational opportunities, prevention-related activities, individual support and referral services, and enforcement of University rules regarding the use of alcohol and illegal drugs.

In keeping with this policy and the intent of Public Law 101-226, Section 22: Drug-Free Schools and Campuses, it is our obligation and responsibility to inform you of the health risks associated with the use of various illicit drugs, nicotine, and the abuse of alcohol. Please note that any substance used through needle-sharing increases the risk of contracting AIDS and hepatitis B.

Controlled Substances: Type of Drug and Possible Health Risks

1. Stimulants – speed up action of central nervous system
 - Amphetamines (speed). *Hallucinations; heart problems; malnutrition; dependency; paranoid psychosis; death. Affects fetal development.*
 - Cocaine (coke, crack) — Classified as a narcotic. *Confusion; depression; convulsions; damaged nasal membranes; lung lesions; dependency; coma; paranoid psychosis; death. Affects fetal development.*
 - MDMA (ecstasy). *Short-term: euphoria; dehydration; loss of inhibition. Long-term: danger to cognitive learning and memory impairment.*
2. Depressants – relax central nervous system
 - Barbiturates (downers). Tranquilizers and methaqualone (ludes). *Confusion; loss of coordination; tolerance; dependency; seizures; coma; death.*
 - *Especially dangerous in combination with alcohol.*
3. Cannabis – alters perception and mood
 - Marijuana and hashish. *Confusion; loss of coordination; memory loss; tolerance; dependence; lung damage. Decreased sex drive.*
4. Hallucinogens – distort reality
 - Lysergic acid diethylamide (LSD, acid), mescaline, MDA, DMT, STP (designer drugs), psilocybin. *Hallucinations; panic; tolerance; flashbacks; possible birth defects in users' children; and long-term psychosis in susceptible persons.*
 - Phencyclidine (PCP, angel dust) – legally classified as a depressant. *Depression; confusion; hallucinations; coma; irrational behavior; tolerance; convulsions; death.*
5. Narcotics – lower pain perception

- Heroin (smack), morphine, codeine, opium. *Lethargy; apathy; loss of judgment and self- control; tolerance; dependence; malnutrition; infection; hepatitis; convulsions; coma; death. Decreased sex drive.*
- 6. Deliriants – cause mental confusion
 - Aerosol products, lighter fluid, paint thinner, amyl nitrite, other inhalants. *Confusion; loss of coordination; hallucinations; convulsions; dependence; damage to lungs, brain, liver, bone marrow; death.*
- 7. Hypnotics – affect consciousness of actions and cause memory loss
 - Water-soluble, tasteless GHB, rohypnol ("rophies"). *Decreased inhibition; sleepiness; memory loss; psychedelic effect.*
- 8. Alcohol – slows reflexes and senses
 - *Tolerance; dependence; depression; coma; death. Linked to cancer; heart and liver damage. Decreased sex performance. Fetal alcohol syndrome.*
- 9. Nicotine – raises heart rate
 - *Emphysema; lung cancer; heart disease; dependence.*

Illicit Drugs

Illegal drug activities are subject to Southern Oregon University, Oregon state, and federal sanctions. Any student who uses, possesses, or distributes illegal drugs on University property or at official University functions is subject to disciplinary action up to and including eviction from the residence halls, expulsion from the University, and criminal prosecution by state and federal authorities.

Oregon penalties for unlawful use, possession and distribution of illegal drugs are based on the following schedule. Most drugs appear on the same federal and state schedule.

Schedule I: Heroin, LSD, peyote, marijuana, mescaline, psilocybin	Class A Felony Up to 20 years and \$100,000 fine	Class B Felony Up to 10 years and \$100,000 fine
Schedule II: Opium, cocaine, Methamphetamine	Class B Felony Up to 10 years and \$100,000 fine	Class C Felony Up to 5 years and \$100,000 fine
Schedule III: Amphetamines, depressants, PCP	Class C Felony Up to 5 years and \$100,000 fine	Class A Misdemeanor Up to 1 year and \$2,500 fine
Schedule IV: Various prescription drugs	Class B Misdemeanor Up to 6 months and \$1,000 fine	Class C Misdemeanor Up to 30 days and \$500 fine
Schedule V: Other less dangerous	Class C Misdemeanor Up to 30 days and \$500 fine	Violation \$500-\$1,000 fine

Manufacture or delivery of a schedule I, II, or III controlled substance within 1,000 feet of the real property comprising a public or private elementary, vocational or secondary school attended by minors is class A felony, penalty of up to 20 years and \$100,000 fine.

All convictions include an additional penalty of twice the value of any resulting gain of property or money. Defendants also pay court costs and forfeit any property used in commission of the crime including vehicles.

Alcohol

Under Oregon law any person under 21 years of age with any amount of alcohol in the blood is considered under the influence of intoxicating liquor under Oregon DUII statutes (class A misdemeanor, penalty of up to 1 year and \$2,500 fine and suspension and/or revocation of driving privileges).

- Minor in possession: any attempt to purchase by a person under 21 years is a violation (up to \$250 fine)
- Providing liquor to a minor is a Class A misdemeanor (up to 1 year in prison and a fine, plus restitution and community service). Mandatory minimums:
 - First conviction - \$350
 - Second conviction - \$1000
 - Third or subsequent conviction - \$1000 and 30 days

The sale, possession, and consumption of alcoholic beverages are governed by Oregon state laws, Ashland city ordinances, and cited University regulations. All members of the University community are obligated to know and obey these laws, ordinances, and regulations. Students at the University are not exempt from state laws or city ordinances. The legal age for purchase and consumption of all alcoholic beverages is twenty-one.

Every Southern Oregon University student has certain rights and responsibilities as a student and citizen. Every student is subject to federal and Oregon State laws as well as the Southern Oregon University **Code of Student Conduct**. Included in the Code of Student Conduct is Southern Oregon University Oregon Administrative Rule Chapter 573, Division 75, Section 0040 which states that any person who engages in the following proscribed conduct shall be subject to sanctions according to University procedures:

- (1) Illegal use, possession, or distribution of drugs or illegal substances on institutionally owned or controlled property or at University sponsored or supervised functions
- (2) Possession, consumption, or furnishing of alcoholic beverages on University-owned or controlled property or at University sponsored or supervised functions, unless authorized by the President
- (3) Appearing in a public place on University premises or at University sponsored or supervised functions under the influence of an intoxicating or illegal substance

Sanctions for proscribed behavior, disciplinary action taken by Southern Oregon University under OAR 573-075-0050 for violation of proscribed conduct may include any of the following: restrictions or loss of privileges, restitution, warning, discretionary assignments, probation, residence unit suspension, residence unit expulsion, interim suspension, interim suspension of participation, University suspension, University expulsion.

All of the above sanctions may be enhanced with additional conditions deemed appropriate by the disciplinary authority, which may include referral for assessment and counseling, and applicable Oregon state and federal statutes.

Referrals for Help

Any student who has personal concerns regarding the use or abuse of any drug is urged to contact Counseling Services for confidential assistance, consultation, and referral. Call 541-552-6213 to make an appointment. Twenty-four-hour crisis service is also available through the Help Line at 541-779-4357. Other resources include community substance abuse care programs, listed under "Drug Abuse Information and Treatment" and "Alcoholism Treatment" in the local phone directory.

COMPUTING RESOURCES ACCEPTABLE USE

COPYRIGHT

Southern Oregon University expects all students to comply with federal copyright laws. Copyright protection covers electronic media, printed materials, and copyrights owned by the University. The absence of a copyright notice cannot be relied upon to indicate that a work is in the public domain.

Electronic Media

Almost all computer programs are protected under the copyright law. The only exception may be public domain software or freeware. Fair use should not be relied upon when using computer programs. Students should carefully examine the terms of the license agreement to determine if the program may be loaded on more than one computer at a given time. It is an infringement of the software publisher's copyright to make unauthorized copies. This may sometimes include copying from storage media to a hard disk. If using institutional software, check with the director of Information Technology regarding the terms of the relevant license.

Many peer to peer file sharing activities violate copyright law. Students should be aware that the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) and Motion Picture Association of America (MPAA) continue to file subpoenas requesting information from colleges and universities about the identities of students engaged in illegal sharing of music and video online. Students engaging in the unauthorized download, reproduction, or distribution of any performance, text, or image, may be personally

sued, liable for large settlements, and subject to possible criminal prosecution. Students are advised that, if served, SOU would be compelled to comply with such requests, and will not accept any financial liability, nor provide legal representation for violators. Changes in rulings of recent court cases, the Digital Millennium Copyright Act, and recent subpoenas and lawsuits are all evidence that copyright owners intend to actively pursue violators. Students should not engage in unauthorized file sharing of copyrighted works!

Printed Material

Copyright law grants owners of copyrights (authors and other creators and publishers) the sole right to do, or allow others to do, each of the following acts with regard to their copyrighted work:

- To reproduce all or part of the work;
- To distribute copies;
- To prepare new versions based on the original work; and
- To perform and display the work publicly.

Although the Copyright Act permits limited copying without the approval of the copyright holder under the concept of fair use, this exception is limited. Students should not assume that any education-related use will qualify as fair use.

EDUCATIONAL USE ALONE IS NOT SUFFICIENT TO MAKE A USE IN QUESTION A FAIR ONE. WHEN IN DOUBT, REQUEST PERMISSION!

Penalties

In addition to injunctive relief, a successful plaintiff in a copyright suit can collect attorney fees plus actual damages. Ignorance of the law does not mean the violation was not "knowing." A student who knowingly infringes copyrights might incur significant personal liability. Finally, Southern Oregon University may also impose disciplinary sanctions.

DISCRIMINATION

Southern Oregon University prohibits discrimination in any educational program or service or in any phase of employment at the University. If any person feels subject to such prohibited discrimination, the procedures outlined in Oregon Administrative Rule 573-035, which follows, shall be used for redressing the grievance.

PURPOSE

These rules state the policy of Southern Oregon University prohibiting discrimination in its education programs, services, facilities and activities. These rules do not apply to claims of discrimination in employment, promotion, tenure, or termination of

employment of classified or unclassified employees. These rules do apply to student workers.

573-035-0010

POLICY

No person shall be subjected to prohibited discrimination in any of Southern Oregon University's education programs or services or school or interschool activities. Those include but are not limited to admissions, recruitment, access to course offerings, counseling, use of facilities, financial assistance, employment assistance, health and insurance benefits and services, and athletics as defined by the rules of the State Board of Higher Education.

DEFINITIONS

For the purposes of OAR 573-035-0005 through OAR 573-035-0080, the following definitions shall be used:

- (1) "Compliance Officer" means the Associate Provost for Curriculum and Personnel or other person designated by the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs or the President of the University.
- (2) "Grievance Officer" means the chief student affairs officer or other person designated by the Vice President for Student Affairs or by the President.
- (3) "Prohibited discrimination" means any act that either in form or operation, whether intended or unintended, differentiates among persons on the basis of age, disability, national origin, race, color, marital status, religion, sex or sexual orientation.
- (4) "Sexual Harassment" means any sexual advance, any request for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature when:
 - (a) Submission to the advances, request or conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of employment or participation in an academic program or activity;
 - (b) Submission or rejection of the advances, request or conduct is used as a basis or condition for employment or academic decisions affecting the student; or
 - (c) Such conduct unreasonably interferes with the work or academic performance of the student because it creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive work or academic environment for the student who is the object of the advance, request, or conduct, and a reasonable person in that student's position would have been similarly affected.
- (5) "Other prohibited harassment" means verbal or physical conduct by an individual based on age, disability, national origin, race, color, marital status, religion, or sexual orientation, which creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive working or academic environment that interferes with a second individual's work or academic performance and a reasonable person in that same situation would have been similarly affected.

INFORMAL RESOLUTION OF GRIEVANCES

A complainant under this Division is encouraged to attempt to resolve the complaint with the involved individual either directly or with the assistance of the Grievance Officer. Any member of the faculty or staff who receives information from a person indicating grounds for a discrimination complaint is urged to refer the person to the Grievance Officer.

DUTIES OF GRIEVANCE OFFICER

(1) Informal Resolution of Grievances: The Grievance Officer helps complainants formulate and follow up complaints of alleged prohibited discrimination. The Grievance Officer may assist in conciliation and informal resolution of the grievance, if informal resolution appears possible.

(2) Formal Complaints: If the grievance cannot be resolved informally, the grievant may submit the complaint in writing to the Compliance Officer. The Grievance Officer may assist the complainant in this process. Formal complaints must set out the specific facts of the complaint, including complainant's suggested resolution of the matter, and be signed by the complainant. The complainant's signature constitutes personal verification that the complaint is accurate and complete.

DUTIES OF COMPLIANCE OFFICER

(1) Receipt of Complaints: A complainant, either individually or through the Grievance Officer, pursues a formal complaint by submitting a written, signed complaint to the Compliance Officer. The Compliance Officer retains the original complaint and delivers copies of it to the President, the Chancellor of the Oregon University System and any individual respondents named in the complaint. To be considered a complaint must be submitted to the Compliance Officer within 180 days from the date of noncompliance, or 365 days from the date of noncompliance if the complaint alleges Sexual Harassment or Other Prohibited Harassment as defined by OAR 573-035-0020.

(2) Investigation of Complaints: The Compliance Officer investigates the matters alleged in the complaint. Within 30 days of receiving the signed, written complaint, the President will provide a written decision based upon actions recommended by the Compliance Officer. The 30-day period for completion of the investigation may be extended for up to 30 additional days, upon application to the Chancellor.

REPORT TO THE CHANCELLOR

The President, or the Compliance Officer at the direction of the President, sends to the Chancellor and to the complainant a report of the investigation.

RETALIATION PROHIBITED

No complainant or participant in any of the actions authorized under these administrative rules shall be subject to reprimand or retaliatory action by the University or its employees for their participation in those actions.

APPEAL TO CHANCELLOR

The complainant may appeal to the Chancellor in the manner and for the reasons provided in OAR 580-015-0105 to 580-015-0155.

GRADE APPEAL

Southern Oregon University practice has been that students who are not in agreement with a grade first discuss the matter with the instructor assigning the grade. If the discussion with the instructor is not satisfactory, the student should discuss the concern with the chairperson of the department.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS/GRADING GRIEVANCE POLICY

Regulation

- (1) To provide a process whereby a student may grieve the process for determining a grade.
- (2) Students should first attempt an informal resolution to a grading grievance. The student shall follow whatever procedure has been established by the school that sponsored the class.
- (3) If unable to resolve the dispute informally, the student may file a grading grievance with the Academic Appeals Committee (AAC). The grievance must be in writing and may include supporting documentation such as the class syllabus.
- (4) The AAC shall consist of 5 members, at least 3 of whom shall be the teaching faculty. These members will come from the existing Academic Standards Committee. One member may be a student and will be appointed by the Dean of Students.
- (5) The AAC will convene a meeting and invite the student and the instructor. Each side will have a chance to present their side.
- (6) The AAC will consider the written grievance, the statements made by both parties and any other related information to reach a decision.
- (7) The student may grieve the process used to arrive at a grade, but may not grieve the grade itself. The AAC will not determine if a grade is justified by the quality of the work submitted by the student. Rather, the AAC will determine whether the process used to determine the grade was flawed.
- (8) The AAC will render a decision within 10 days of the grievance meeting. Their decision is final.

MEASLES IMMUNIZATION REQUIREMENT

All students entering Southern Oregon University who are enrolled for at least 12 undergraduate credits or 9 graduate credits and were born on or after January 1, 1957, must provide proof of immunity to rubeola (hard measles) to the Student Health and Wellness Center (SHWC). This may be done by documenting either having had the disease or having had two vaccinations against measles on or after your first birthday and at least thirty days apart, or having had a second measles vaccination on or after December 1989.

Note: If you do not provide proof of immunity to measles, you will not be allowed to register for classes at Southern Oregon University for any term following your first term. Proof of immunity may be submitted on the health history form sent to all newly admitted students. You may be exempted from this requirement for religious or medical reasons. If you need to receive an immunization, contact your physician or your local county health department, or contact the Student Health and Wellness Center by calling 552-6126 or visiting www.sou.edu/health.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT POLICY

SEXUAL MISCONDUCT POLICY

The University is a community of trust that depends on strict adherence to standards of conduct set by its members. Sexual misconduct is a serious violation of the standards and will not be tolerated. The University encourages all members of the University community to become aware of both the consequences of sexual misconduct and the options available to victims.

Sexual misconduct is defined as sexual contact without consent and includes: intentional touching, either of the victim or when the victim is forced to touch, directly or through clothing, another person's genitals, breasts, thighs, or buttocks; rape (sexual intercourse without consent, whether by an acquaintance or a stranger); attempted rape; sodomy (oral or anal intercourse) without consent; or sexual penetration with an object without consent. To constitute lack of consent, the acts must be committed either by force, intimidation, or through use of the victim's mental incapacity, intoxication, or physical helplessness. Consent requires speech indicating a freely given agreement to have sexual intercourse or participate in sexual activities. Silence, previous sexual relationships, or current relationships are not an indication of consent. The use of alcohol or drugs may limit the capacity to give consent. (In February 2004 the Harvard School of Public Health College Alcohol

Study, which involved 119 schools nationwide, reported that alcohol was involved in nearly 72 percent of rapes.)

A student or employee charged with sexual misconduct may be disciplined under the University's Code of Student Conduct and prosecuted under Oregon criminal statutes. SOU may pursue disciplinary action independent of the criminal justice system. Under Oregon Administrative Rules, this could result in dismissal from the University. Results of campus disciplinary proceedings involving sex offenses are presented to the accuser as well as the accused. Upon request, the dean of students can assist victims of sexual assault in making needed academic or campus living situation changes.

Educational programs directed toward the prevention of rape, acquaintance rape, and other sex offenses are sponsored and presented on a regular basis by the campus-wide Prevention of Sexual Assault Committee, Inter-Residence Hall Council (IRC), and the Women's Resource Center (WRC). Students may check with the Dean of Students (SU 310), IRC, or WRC for specific information.

Sexual assaults of any nature should be of serious concern to everyone on campus. Victims of such crimes, regardless of severity, are encouraged to talk to some one they trust and seek assistance:

A victim's report of sexual assault to an SOU official is confidential (meaning that names and identifying information will not be shared; the type of incident and information regarding the incident may be shared among campus offices). Prompt reporting is encouraged to preserve evidence on the victim's person or at the crime scene. Consult medical personnel within seventy-two hours. To keep open the option of criminal prosecution, the victim should not bathe or change clothing before reporting the assault, despite discomforts. Reporting of sexual assault is strongly encouraged.

REGISTERED SEXUAL OFFENDER POLICY

Any SOU employee or student who is required by law to register as a sex offender is expected to comply with all reporting and registration requirements under applicable state and federal laws. Individuals are expected to self-report to SOU Campus Public Safety.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBER DISCLOSURE AND CONSENT STATEMENT

You are requested to provide voluntarily your Social Security Number to assist OUS (and organizations conducting studies for or on behalf of OUS) in developing, validating, or administering predictive tests and assessments; administering student aid programs; improving instruction; internal identification of students; collection of student debts; or comparing student educational experiences with subsequent workforce experiences. When conducting studies, OUS will disclose your Social Security Number only in a manner that does not permit personal identification of you by individuals other than representatives of OUS (or the organization conducting the study for OUS) and only if the information is destroyed when no longer needed for the purposes for which the study was conducted.
